



GARDEN CLUB

Woo-hoo! Winter is almost gone. The good news is that with February comes the hope of spring. Our gardens will be coming alive shortly. And after this long winter, if you're like me, you just can't wait to get seeds started and begin preparing for outside.

Seed and nursery catalogues will be arriving soon. While reviewing, don't forget to look for plants with improved insect and disease drought tolerance. Order plants and seeds now to be ready when the ground thaws. You might also want to start some herbs indoors such as parsley or basil to get a head start.

With all our thoughts of spring and outside gardens, don't forget we still have to check our inside plants.

If you received a poinsettia for Christmas, hopefully, you have managed to keep it alive until now. Give it at least 6 hours of abundant light. Maintain temperatures that are comfortable to people. Underwatering will cause leaves to wilt and shed. Overwatering will cause roots to die. So be careful and check frequently. Wait till night temperatures are consistently at least 55 degrees before planting outside in full sun with good drainage. They are a lovely shrublike plant outdoors, but they will not survive our winters and must be brought inside if you want to keep them. You might even get them to bloom again. But be forewarned, it is a long procedure that requires much patience. Easier to buy a new one next year.

Amaryllis aftercare: Remove spent flower after blooming. Set the plant in a bright sunny window to allow the leaves to fully develop. Keep the soil evenly moist not soggy. Fertilize occasionally with a general-purpose houseplant formulation.

Some additional February Hints:

- Continue to inspect indoor plants for insects such as Spider Mites which cause leaf wilt with spider webs or Whitefly which are small, white insects on underside of leaf. Spray with insecticidal soap, if needed.
- Start to fertilize houseplants on a regular basis with a water-soluble fertilizer prepared at half strength until growth is healthy.
- Remove diseased or damaged limbs from trees and shrubs. Leave more severe pruning for March.
- Bring Spring into your home a little early with branches of forsythia, pussy willow and quince brought inside to force bloom.

Our first meeting of the new year will be Wednesday, March 10, at 10:30 AM, hopefully, in the Lion's Den, COVID-19 permitting. Stay safe, hope to see you there.

George Washington once told his father "I cannot tell a lie...." YES, I was given a hatchet gift & cut down your favorite tree".... A CHERRY TREE...

So in honor of his truthfulness, let's talk about some SPECIAL "CHERRY RECIPES" ...!

<u>CROCK POT CHERRY CHICKEN RECIPE</u> - serves 4-6 ppl.

1 1/2 lbs. of skinned drumsticks or breasts (or pork chops)

1/2 tsp lemon herb seasoning (could use Mrs. Dash)

1/2 can dark sweet cherries (pitted & drained)

1/2 bottle (6 oz.) chili sauce

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

Place all ingredients in cooker low 5-6 hrs. or high 3-4 hrs. Sauce can be thickened with 1 tbsp cornstarch.

ITALIAN CHERRY CHEESE CAKE -

- 1. Place in a large bowl 3lbs whole milk ricotta cheese
- 2. Beat in 6 eggs, 1 at a time
- 3. Beat in 1 1/4 cup sugar
- 4. 1 tsp vanilla

COMBINE the following 3 ingredients, in a separate bowl, mix well then add to the above.

5. 4 tbsp corn starch, 2 tbsp melted butter, 1-pint sour cream.

USE A 10" SPRING FORM PAN.

BAKE 1 hr. in a preheated 375 deg. oven until brown on top. (look through window - do not open oven).

LEAVE IN OVEN TO COOL OVER NIGHT OR FOR SEVERAL HRS.

Just before you are ready to serve; you can place cherry pie filling topping.

Other toppings are great options: blueberry etc.

When you joined our community, you signed an agreement to abide by the Bylaws of the Lions Head South Association. As a new member of our community, you should have received a copy of these Bylaws which include the Rules and Regulations that govern us all. If you did not receive a copy, one can be obtained from the Administrator's office in the clubhouse. There are certain things contained in the Architectural Section of these Bylaws that pertain to the exterior of your new home. Please read these carefully. Below are outlined just a few of these Bylaws which should be of interest to you. Specific details are covered in said Bylaws.

Exterior Modification:

Any changes to the home such as Windows, Doors, Siding, Roofs, Soffets, Patios, etc. REQUIRE AN APPLICATION WHICH MUST BE APPROVED BY THE ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE. Applications are available from the Association Office in the Clubhouse.

Trees & Tree Trimming:

All homes are required to have at least one deciduous tree on the street side of the dwelling. Minimum height is 5 feet. Bylaws contain a list of approved tree types. Planting of these trees is **HOMEOWNER RESPONSIBILITY**. The trimming/pruning of trees and shrubs adjacent to your home is also your responsibility. This includes trees in back of the home separating you from your neighbor - this is not common ground, but is considered "green area". All trees/shrubs in the green area are your responsibility. Once again, see the Bylaws for details.

Garbage/Recycle Cans:

The Bylaws provide specific guidelines as to when these items can be put out for collection; and when they must be removed. PLEASE NOTE: All Garbage/Recycle containers must be stored inside the garage when not out for collection.

Air Conditioners:


All the homes in our community have central air conditioning systems. WINDOW OR THRU-THE-WALL AIR CONDITIONERS ARE NOT PERMITTED.

The purpose of the Architectural Committee is to maintain the appearance of our community. None of the Bylaw requirements are overly restrictive, and many homeowners have completed extensive remodeling projects within the guidelines provided by these Bylaws.



MARDI GRAS/ SHROVE TUESDAY

The Old Farmer's Almanac

Mardi Gras is French for "Fat Tuesday" - Feb. 16, 2021, the final feasting before the fasting of Lent, which begins tomorrow, Ash Wednesday. Fat Tuesday is also called Shrove Tuesday, a name that comes from the practice of shriving - purifying oneself through confession--prior to Lent. Many of the names applied to this day relate to food and eating.

In many Latin countries, Mardi Gras is the culmination of the carnival season of revelry and feasting. (Carnival from the Latin carnem levare, means to take meat away.) Among the Pennsylvania Dutch, this Tuesday is Fastnacht (fast night), and everyone enjoys the traditional fastnachtkuchen, a rectangular doughnut with a slit in the middle. For the English, Shrove Tuesday is also called Pancake Day, as they use up the cooking fats that are forbidden during Lent.

CANDLEMAS/GROUNDHOG DAY

The Old Farmer's Almanac

It's no accident that Groundhog Day and Candlemas are celebrated together Feb. 2, 2021, for both signify the triumph of light over darkness, spring over winter. Candlemas was originally a Celtic festival marking the "cross-quarter day," or midpoint of the season. The Sun is halfway on its advance from the winter solstice to the spring equinox. The Christian church expanded this festival of light to commemorate the purification of the Virgin Mary and her presentation of the infant Jesus in the Temple. Candlelit processions accompanied the feast day. Since the traditional Candlemas celebration anticipated the planting of crops, a central focus of the festivities was the forecasting of either an early spring or a lingering winter. Sunshine on Candlemas was said to indicate the return of winter. Similarly, "When the wind's in the east on Candlemas Day, there it will stick till the second of May."

For centuries, farmers in France and England looked to the bear, while those in Germany looked to a badger for a sign. In the 1800s, German immigrants to Pennsylvania brought their Candlemas legends with them. Finding no badgers there, but lots of groundhogs or woodchucks, they adapted the New World species to fit the lore. Since 1887, that lore has grown into a full-blown festival, with Punxsutawney Phil presiding. For all things groundhog, visit the folks at Punxsutawney and see what Phil is predicting this year.

PRIORITY FOR DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2020-2021 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation, or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a physician script/note which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician. Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal.

The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food, so there is no need to leave the house during, or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.



Krime Photography

Aperture, Shufter, Program

This month we'll discuss controlling the exposure for a desired effect. Most cameras have a mode dial with many settings including aperture, shutter, and program priority. But which should you use and why. For a pleasing overall effect and even exposure you can use the program or auto mode and let the camera make the decisions for you. We'll discuss Aperture and Shutter priority in the coming months.

In Auto mode the camera makes all the decisions for you. You frame your shot, focus, and push the shutter button. this will work well in most situations and give you a pleasing image.

In Program mode the camera will make most of the decisions for you. You can still choose to over and under expose and control whether to use the flash, among other things. this gives you more control of your image and can come in handy in tougher photographic situations.

If you're new to photography, I suggest you start with Auto and move to Program when you feel more comfortable making some changes. After you've mastered these modes it may be time to go to Aperture or Shutter priority.
