

Hello November!

A reminder to our residents to attend the Garden Club's SAVE THE MONARCHS event on November 9th at 2 pm. At the time of this publication's distribution, there will be approximately one week left to sign up on the Garden Club bulletin board. We just need to know how many are attending for setup and refreshments.

November puts us deeper into fall and nature is winding down. That doesn't mean our garden chores are over. This is a good time to evaluate your yard's garden layout, especially around your house's foundation. Plants may still be standing in November, but this is a great time to see what needs to be removed, added to, or moved within the garden. The bones of the garden are more visible in late fall, and now is the time to add more structure if needed. Would an evergreen look good at the back of the border, or do you need a taller tree or shrub in the corner? Have fun and play around with the design of foundation plants. Small changes with these plants can make a big impact.

Don't be stuck on planting your evergreens in a straight line along the front of the house, pruned tightly beneath the windows like a mustache under a nose. If your foundation doesn't sport them, your neighbor's likely does. In an age of unconventional gardens and an endless supply of unique

plants, this type of planting may be the last resort. Consider planting spring bulbs among your shrubs for more interest. (Reference: www.finegardening.com)

Now, you ask.....What are my November garden chores?

November is generally a cool, (grey) month in the northeast. It can snow, and truly wintry weather is not that far away. This month is a good time to:

- •! Deer-proof evergreen shrubs by encircling them with stakes and attaching burlap to the stakes.
- •! Protect the bark of saplings from gnawing critters by wrapping tree guards around the lowest parts of the trunks.
- •! To protect a plant from voles, avoid piling up mulch too close to the plant.
- •! Plant spring bulbs.
- •! Finish raking leaves off the lawn.



•! Set up any outdoor Christmas decorations you use in late November before it gets bitterly cold outside.

Hope you have had a chance to enjoy the Fall decorations in some of our gardens and around the Clubhouse because we enjoy doing this for your enjoyment.

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LHS WOMEN'S CLUB



It's the time of the year to cook "SQUASH", and a great time for SENIORS to COOK & BAKE as an indoor activity!

The name "SQUASH" comes to us from the NARAGANSOTT NATIVE AMERICAN WORD "askutasquash". SQUASH grows in many colors, shapes & sizes. Most are rich in vitamins A & C, AND A GOOD SOURCE of IRON They are thick skinned and filled inside with seeds and a stringy membrane.

GOURDS are not considered SQUASH, except for the PUMPKIN. Although pumpkins are part of the gourd family, they are developed from a flower and the skin/flesh is edible, both being factors. If you visit a Pumpkin/Squash patch, be sure to come home with one or two of the fruits. YES, SQUASH is a fruit, vine grown and developed from an edible flower. By the way, November is always a smart way to begin the comfort food SEASON!

Slow Cooker Butternut Squash Lentil Stew Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups red lentils (rinsed)

2 cups butternut squash cubed

5 cups low sodium veggie stock

1 cup carrots 3-4 peeled & sliced

2 cups sweet potatoes (1/2-inch cubes)

1 1/2 cups chopped celery

1 cup chopped onion

5 cloves minced garlic

8

1 tsp cumin

1/2 tsp coriander

1/4 black pepper

1 tsp salt

3 cups spinach

1 tbsp white vinegar

Directions:

- 1. Prepare first 8 ingredients as directed & place in slow cooker
 - 2. Cook for 3 hrs on low
 - 3. Season with the next 4 ingredients
- 4. Cook for an additional 2 hrs in slow cooker on medium
 - 5. Add last 2 ingredients, cook for 1 hr. additional Makes 4 servings

Pumpkin Swirl Cream Cheese Muffins

Ingredients:

2 lg eggs

1/2 cup vegetable oil

15 ozs. pumpkin puree

1 cup granulated sugar

1 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

2 tsp pumpkin spice

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp Kosher salt

8 oz. cream cheese

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar (10x)

OPTIONAL add ins....1/2 cup cranberries, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 375*, spray muffin tin

- 2. In a large bowl beat eggs, veggie oil, vanilla extract, pumpkin puree, granulated sugar
- 3. Add to bowl > flour, pumpkin spice, baking soda & salt; stir with spatula until combined. If any OPTIONS are chosen, add in at this point.
 - 4. Fill each muffin cup 3/4 with mixture.
- 5. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese until smooth, adding 10X sugar.
- 6. Top each muffin with 1 tbsp of cream cheese mixture, use toothpick to swirl.
- 7. Bake 18 20 mins. Insert toothpick to check for completed baking. It's okay if a bit of cake shows on the toothpick. Baking completed.

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PRIORITY FOR DRIVEWAY SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach another winter season, we again find it necessary to clarify who qualifies for the Priority Snow Removal list for 2022-2023 winter season. A new request is required every season.

For those who qualify, please submit your request to assure that you will be placed on the priority list. To qualify, a resident must require regular life-sustaining medical treatment, such as chemotherapy, radiation, or dialysis in or outside the home.

A "heart condition" does not qualify. Your request must be accompanied by a **physician script/note** which specifies that life-sustaining treatment for any of the conditions outlined above is necessary. Hand written notes are unacceptable. All information will be kept by the administrator and will be confidential.

For convenience purposes, your doctor may fax this information to our office. Our fax number is 732-920-2650. Please be assured this information will be kept strictly confidential. Placement on the Priority Snow List cannot be accomplished until we receive the necessary documentation from your physician.

Your need to go to work does not qualify for priority snow removal. For this purpose, we suggest you make advance arrangements with a private contractor for snow removal.

The township will cooperate by plowing our roads so that our contractor can begin work. Of course, the town will continue to respond to any serious problems during storms.

ALWAYS CALL 911 FOR ANY MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Please be sure to keep on hand extra supplies of medications and food so that you do not need to leave the house during or immediately after a snowstorm. The weather predications generally provide ample warning time for making preparations.

Please respond as soon as possible as the winter season will be here soon.
